Purna Ra (pictured left) is a refugee from Bhutan and is proud of the success he and many members of his family have had in learning English and getting jobs with help from the lowa International Center. Purna spent over 25 years in a refugee camp in Nepal, where each of his four children were born and grew into adulthood. Purna arrived in Des Moines in 2011 and he, along with his four adult children, began attending the Accessible ESL classes at Deer Ridge Apartments in 2013. They have made major progress in their English proficiency and three of his adult children have found jobs.

He is an ambassador for the arts and technology through his work with the STEM Advisory Council and Ballet Des Moines, and helps to increase understanding of the Sikh religion in Iowa as part of the group that established the Sikh Gurudwara in Johnston, Iowa.

LI ZHAO MANDELBAUM is originally from China, and is President of China Operations with China Iowa Group in West Des Moines, Iowa. Her vision for an effective business relationship between Iowa and China has built cultural bridges with Chinese suppliers/buyers to further the understanding of US business and culture. She actively advocates for greater culturalunderstanding through her volunteer work with the World Food Prize, Chinese Association, Broadlawns Medical Center and numerous other community organizations.

AIDDY PHOMVISAY is originally from Laos, and is Principal of Marshalltown High School in Marshalltown, lowa. By sharing his personal experiences as a child refugee coming to a small lowa town, he enriches the lives of students and speaks personally about the need to develop cultural understanding. He has been a teacher in the West Des Moines and Ames School Districts, as well as Drake and ISU, and has helped to develop leadership opportunities for teachers around the state. His work in bullying prevention has created a greater sense of purpose throughout the community of Marshalltown. In 2014, he was named Secondary Principal of the Year by the School Administrators of Iowa (SAI).

CLAUDIA SCHABEL is originally from Brazil, and is the Organizational Vibrancy Champion at DuPont Pioneer in Johnston, Iowa. In this role, she helped the company's global team develop a cohesive Diversity and Inclusion program, and led the initiative to develop guidelines used by the company's global resource groups. She is also highly involved in the Greater Des Moines Partnership's Diversity & Inclusion Council and is currently a mentor with the Latina Leadership Initiative in Des Moines.
