2015 Passport to Prosperity honoree Mone Aye (who will be honored this coming September and is pictured top left) and 2010 Passport Honoree Zeljka Krvavica (pictured lower left) were recently honored at the White House as two of ten World Refugee Day "Champions of Change." The White House's Champion of Change program celebrates the efforts of Americans making a difference in their community. Mone is a bilingual community outreach worker with the Des Moines Public Schools and co-founder and Board Member of EMBARC (Ethnic Minority of Burma Advocacy and Resource Center) in Des Moines. She was born in the Mae La Refugee camp in Thailand and lived there for 19 years. In 2008, Mone resettled in the United States, became a U.S. citizen in 2014. Zeljka works as a Refugee Case Manager with the Iowa Bureau of Refugee Services in Des Moines. She came to the United States in 1993 as a refugee from Bosnia and Herzegovina after fleeing her home in war-ravaged Sarajevo. She is a founding member of the Iowa Interpreters and Translators Association (IITA), a Cultural Ambassador for CultureAll, an advocate for refugee women's rights and former IIC Board Member. 
IIC Interpreters Gain Great Knowledge at IITA Conference

40 Years of Resettlement:The Vietnamese American Community in Iowa

Vinh Nguyen is the English Language Learner (ELL) Program Coordinator for the Des Moines Public Schools, who helps to provide resources for young refugees and immigrants dealing with the language barriers and cultural struggles he once experienced. Vinh will be joined by a Vietnamese marine veteran and a young Vietnamese entrepreneur for this Dialogue program, and the group will share issues affecting the different waves of Vietnamese migration, and the impact in the community over the last 40 years - a timely subject given the fact that 2015 marks the 40th year since the Fall of Saigon.

Stay Informed: IIC's Free Statewide 24/7 Emergency Interpretation Hotline

This is a valuable resource for emergency responders, law enforcement officers, and direct service personnel in lowa who need to ensure clear communication with non-English speakers in crisis situations. We are happy to provide this resource and want to share a few guidelines for utilizing the service:

• The Free 24/7 Emergency Interpretation Hotline will connect users to interpreters via phone in 220 languages, and can be accessed by calling the Iowa International Center at

515-282-8269 and selecting option 5. You'll be redirected and asked for a client code - **7092.** Please be prepared to answer general questions about your usage. The lowa International Center relies on this information to plan for additional outreach and to plan for future funding.

- Designed to assist first responders and non-English speakers in moments of crisis, when no other interpretation service or multilingual person is available to help and when communication is critical. In using the hotline, we ask that if possible, please limit calls to emergency situations, and please keep calls at 30 minutes maximum.
- If you need more extensive interpretation services for your organization, the lowa International Center provides <u>central lowa's largest network of in-person interpretation services in 60 languages</u>. Our staff would be happy to help you plan for future appointments to meet your multilingual communication needs. Call 515-282-8269, ext. 16 for more information.
